



May 2023 Activities - Bender Collection

The Bender Liberty Seated Half Dimes: The unique 1870-S half dime from the Bender family collection was sold in the January 2023 FUN auction for a bit more than three million dollars. However, it is not the only exceptional half dime in the Bender cabinet. Virtually every date in the series, and in the Bender Family Collection, is represented by one of the finest examples known. The Bender Seated half dimes in the May CSNS auction included other rarities and some high-grade examples as listed below:

1840-O with drapery	PCGS MS62 CAC	\$12,600
1846	PCGS MS63	\$43,200

The Curious Collector by Len Augsburger, LSCC #1271

Christian Gobrecht Presents a Walking Stick to Thomas Jefferson

An extract from the Proceedings of the American Antiquarian Society for 1921 sets the stage for this month's investigation:

"Samuel Sower was not the constructor of that watch on the head of a walking stick, which I mentioned in my other letter. Christopher Gobrecht, now of Philadelphia, an ingenious artist and engraver, was the constructor of that watch, Gobrecht was then engaged in the Baltimore foundry. Gobrecht presented that cane to Jefferson, while president. Jefferson offered to pay him for it. This affronted Gobrecht. But Jefferson informed him he accepted of no gifts, and on that ground could not receive it as a voluntary present."

Extraordinary claims demand extraordinary proof, so let's dig in and ask some questions.

Who wrote this? The author was William McCulloch, a Philadelphia printer active in the early 19th century. The quote above appeared in McCulloch's correspondence with Isaiah Thomas, who wrote the two volume History of Printing in America in 1810. The extensive correspondence from McCulloch to Thomas was not published until 1921 in the American Antiquarian Society Proceedings.

Does the Isaiah Thomas volume include this story? It does not. This is not surprising as McCulloch was reacting to the Thomas volume and would not have repeated a story from Thomas.

Who was Samuel Sower? McCulloch identifies Sower as the owner of a Baltimore type foundry as of 1806 and indicates that Gobrect worked for Sower. This fits with the known facts – Gobrecht was born in Hanover, PA in 1785 (some sources give 1784) and worked for a short time in Baltimore before permanently moving to Philadelphia in the early 1810s. We know that Gobrecht delivered type punches to the Mint in the 1820s prior to his eventual appointment as second Engraver in 1836.

What do we know about walking sticks? Walking sticks were frequently topped with ornamental objects such as medals, or, in this case, a watch.

Is there related correspondence? The Founders Online site, which has captured extensive correspondence related to the Founding Fathers (including Jefferson), contains no mentions of Gobrecht, or Gobright (an alternative spelling sometimes seen). If Gobrecht's offer was in writing, it was not captured in Jefferson's extensive correspondence.

Where was Jefferson at this time? Jefferson was president from 1801-1809. Was Jefferson visiting in Baltimore, or was Gobrecht in Washington? We have no indication of where this supposed interaction took place.

Is there a walking stick at Monticello? There is, and the documentation behind it is thorough (https://www.monticello.org/research-education/thomas-jefferson-encyclopedia/bone-walking-stick/). To summarize, Jefferson received the stick in 1805, which was "capped & painted with gold very handsomely embost [embossed]." It was a gift from John F. Oliveira Fernandes, a Norfolk physician and wine merchant (an interesting combination, this) from whom Jefferson had purchased wine for Monticello. Jefferson acknowledged the gift in writing on February 28, 1806 (https://founders.archives.gov/?q=fernandes&s=1111311111&sa=&r=16&sr=).

Did Jefferson have a policy on accepting gifts? On April 18, 1806, Jefferson wrote to Levett Harris (an American diplomat) "I had laid it down as law for my conduct while in office, & hitherto scrupulously observed, to accept of no present beyond a book, a pamphlet, or other curiosity of minor value; as well to avoid imputations on my motives of action...." (full text at https://founders.archives.gov/documents/Jefferson/99-01-02-3593).

Did Gobrecht have other Presidential contact? In 1823, after the death of the Engraver Robert Scot, Gobrecht appealed, unsuccessfully, to President Monroe for the position. This written communication survives. The position of Mint Director has always been a political appointment, and political connections constitute valuable currency in that context.

The skinny: We can't say for sure, but I'm inclined to believe that Gobrecht did in fact offer a walking stick to Jefferson, who evidently judged the included watch as exceeding a "curiosity of minor value." Gobrecht may or may not have been motivated by politics, but having friends in high places never hurts.





New Book on 1839 Half Dollars is Now Available By Jim Koenings



The above photo shows the cover page of my new book on 1839 Half Dollars. To the best of my knowledge this new book is the only complete collection of all 15 die marriages for the year 1839. This book has all 8 known die marriages of 1839 Capped Bust Reeded Edge Half Dollars including the highest graded certified specimen of 1839 GR in NGC AU50. It also includes all 7 Liberty Seated Half Dollar die marriages.


I have been a member of John Reich Collectors Society (JRCS) since June of 1986 and a member of Liberty Seated Coin Club (LSCC) since November 2020. I bought my first Reeded Edge Half Dollar in November 2009 and by November 2017, I had 53 of the 56 known die marriages. Since then, I have become a very serious die state collector and believe my collection of Reeded Edge Halve is the most complete in the world.

In August 2022, I purchased my first 1839 Liberty Seated Half Dollar, an 1839 WB-6 in PCGS XF45 in a Heritage Auction and hoped to find the remaining 6 die marriages in the same grade. That didn't happen. However, eight months later, I did find them in reasonable grades and they are now shown in my new book.

It has been 11 years since Dick Graham printed his book "A Registry of Die Varieties of Reeded Edge Half Dollars 1836-1839". Things change, rarities change and new information has been learned.

This book "The Koenings Collection of 1839 Philadelphia Half Dollars, including Liberty Seated Half Dollars" is my attempt to inform all collectors of the opportunities available for the year 1839. It includes numerous die states of 1839 die marriages including newly discovered information on 1839 GR-8's with greatly Rotated reverses.

The book also covers the history of previous authors and includes extra large photos of each obverse and reverse (6" in diameter). It is 8.5" x 11" and has protective Mylar covers along with spiral binding that allows you to open the book and lay it flat to see both pages of a particular die marriage. There are more than 71 pages plus indexes and a total of 65 extra large photos.

It is now available to LSCC members for \$39 plus \$4 for shipping and handling. Only 100 copies have been printed. If you would like a copy, please send a check or money order to:

By Weight, Not by Coyne - An Introduction to Chopmarked Coins W. Taylor Leverage

As the world opened up in the Age of Discovery, new trade routes were drawn across oceans, establishing the first truly global commercial networks. Luxury goods from China, European governments, and new trading powerhouses came together to lay the foundations for modern-day corporations and international politics. At the heart of this commercial revolution was silver, the only means of exchange that found acceptance at every port - massive quantities of the metal, taken from the Spanish American colonies and ports across the world, became the lifeblood of commerce around the globe, particularly in China itself.

Much of the silver that made its way to Southeast Asia bears marks of its time spent there - chop marks, private countermarks indicating acceptable silver content. Long dismissed by many collectors as simple damage, chop marks have since gained a much more consistent following as artifacts of trade, and both the diverse range of host types and the unique histories associated with them - both of which are found in this book - make them a fascinating area for collectors.

Featuring more than 300 images, *By Weight, Not by Coyne* explores the history of foreign silver in China and the coins that were actually used in trade, covering more than 35 countries and hundreds of types. The commercial and political context of each type is paired with rarity ratings and auction appearances, which makes the book a useful tool to both the researcher and the collector in this traditionally overlooked area of trading history.
