Who is this Club Member?





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Quarter of the Month by Greg Johnson, LSCC #1460

The 1876-S Quarter Dollar With Repunched Mintmark?

No matter how much time is spent studying there is always more to be learned. This month's lesson arrived in the form of an unexpected email from collector Josh Boyd, who was connected to me by editor Bill Bugert. Josh had an 1876-S quarter that brought up an attribution question. I have spent a lot of time on seated quarters, but have to confess that I have tended to focus on the better dates and particularly on the no motto portion of the series. The 1876-S is both a common date, with a mintage of 8,596,000, and a with motto issue. My knowledge of and experience with the 1876-S is really quite limited.

The question at hand was, is this a repunched mintmark, and if so, is it a known variety of the 1876-S? The photos provided clearly show a repunched mintmark so we moved on to the second question. A review of Briggs' *The Comprehensive Encyclopedia of United States Liberty Seated Quarters* revealed some fairly crude mintmarks on 1876-S quarters, but none that were repunched like Mr. Boyd's coin. Similarly, a carefully review of the *Gobrecht Journal* was no help in finding prior reference to an 1876-S quarter with RPM. A more cursory sampling of the Heritage Archive also failed to produce another example.

After spending some significant time looking for, and not finding, evidence of a previously reported **RPM**, I am turning the question over to *E-Gobrecht* readers. The 1876-S is a plentiful issue, who has one with the repunched mintmark shown in the photo?



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Cracked, Shattered, and Terminal by Benny Haimovitz, LSCC #2494

1848 Half Dollar WB-7, R-3 Repunched 18, Double Die Reverse, Liberty Seated Half Dollar



It appears that 1848 was a somewhat lower mintage year for the Philadelphia mint with only some 580,000 half dollars being produced. The WB-7 is a most interesting die marriage from that mintage.



The primary obverse diagnostic is a very clearly repunched 18. In addition, this later die state example also shows a die crack just passing the left edge of the rock support which becomes heavier at the lower end, forming a small rim cud.



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The reverse has several points of interest to consider. Slight die doubling can be noticed in some of the eagle's upper right wing feathers and perhaps more noticeably in the letters OF AMERICA. In addition, the top of the first vertical shield line is apparent through the horizontal shield lines in the top left corner.

As the die state progresses, the strongest crack appears from the rim at K-8, across the top of the NITED, and back out to the rim at K -10. A less severe crack develops from the rim along the bottom of HALF to DOL.

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Auction News by Craig Eberhart, LSCC #1348

PCGS Members Only Show, Legend Regency Auction, New Orleans, May 16-17. The Legend rare coin auctions are dominated by coins that fit particularly well in high-grade PCGS Registry sets. However, these auctions often include some less expensive "collector" coins. This auction is no exception with a nice selection of uncirculated, but less than gem, no motto <u>Liberty Seated Half Dollars</u>. They include the Eliasberg 1840-O, two gold CAC-stickered coins, and a choice AU-58 1855-S. In higher grades, the 1855-S is a legitimately rare coin with only three AU-58 coins and two uncirculated coins in the PCGS population report.

News & Notes

Memorial Day brings the annual cooling off period in the coin business, something that should be less true in the Internet Age but for some reason is not. Even though we are constantly connected we still see dealer sales fall and website traffic become stagnant. This makes even less sense when you consider the demographics of coin collectors - skewing older, and in theory without kids still at home. Nevertheless, watch the dealer reports the next few weeks and you will see what I mean. Harry Laibstain's In The Loupe commented on May 29: "Another indication of summer is the transitional mode where business slows as summer begins and builds the closer we get to ANA...." All of this spells opportunity for the buyer. If you sense stale inventory on your favorite dealer's website, June or July is an excellent time to pick up the phone and practice your negotiating skills.

The summer calendar retains the usual selection of events - major shows in Baltimore and Long Beach in June, Summer FUN in Orlando in July, all leading up to the ANA convention in Philadelphia in August. In addition the ANA will host the Summer Seminar in Colorado Springs in June. The Summer Seminar is not highly attended (a few hundred people each year) but should be. Although a 4-day commitment, this is a great opportunity to pick the expert's brains and soak in numismatics for a few days. I will be sitting in the colonial paper money class taught by John Kraljevich and Erik Goldstein during the first session. This is more than a class, as the ANA goes into "open house" mode for the duration. In addition there are plenty of sponsored side activities in Colorado Springs and the surrounding area. Make the effort to attend once and you'll be hooked.

The weekly E-Sylum (May 27) had an interesting article on holed Liberty Seated dimes and half dimes found during the relocation of graves in the Freedman's Cemetery in Dallas, TX. This cemetery was active from 1869 to 1907. In the 1990s, a highway expansion required moving the graves, and a careful excavation took place. One of the more interesting finds was a number of holed half dimes and dimes, presumably placed as charms to protect from illness and witchcraft. The majority of the coins were dated from the highmintage periods of the 1850s and 1870s - no surprise, and consistent with the known circulation patterns of Liberty Seated coinage in this period. Mintmarks, if any, were not recorded. One suspects a few New Orleans coins must have been present.

The finest ever set of mint state Liberty Seated dollars sold to Dell Loy Hansen, a Utah collector, in February. Built by Bruce Morelan and Legend Numismatics, the set had been publicly exhibited on multiple occasions. Hansen is actively working toward a complete set of U.S. coinage. The sale, brokered by David Lawrence Rare Coins, is just one piece of a large puzzle. When working on a set of thousands of coins, buying one or two at a time simply won't work. This is problem none of us will ever have, but is interesting to contemplate. Most collections of Liberty Seated coinage comprise on the order of a hundred pieces, and the "one at a time" approach is more realistic. Massive collections that turn into the all-time greats are a different beast - and usually include purchases in chunks, like this.
