Coins, Stocks, and Fear

The coronavirus is on everyone's mind, and the repeated thousand-point swings in the Dow grab attention even if you are not heavily invested in the stock market. Gold has solidly moved from the \$1500 range to \$1600 in the last few weeks as investors seek safe haven in the yellow metal. As of this writing, 657,000 cases of coronavirus have been reported (119,000 in the United States), with 30,000 deaths (2,000 in the U.S. and rising quickly). Fatalities strike the elderly in disproportionate numbers, and pre-existing conditions such as cardiovascular disease or diabetes are associated with higher death rates.

Meanwhile, "normal" influenza has caused between 12,000 and 61,000 fatalities annually in the U.S. *alone* since 2010. Traffic fatalities claim about 37,000 per year in the U.S. Gun-related deaths claim 40,000 annually. People die in car accidents every day, and we get used to it. Cell phone use in recent years has distracted pedestrians, and the fatality rate is increasing. Billions of people use cell phones, so we get used to it. Gun ownership in the U.S. is ubiquitous, people die every day, and we write it off to drugs, gangs, or the sorts of idiotic gun accidents that get characterized as "evolution at work."

The point being, there are a lot of things that can kill you, but right now coronavirus isn't the most likely cause. But it's getting attention for a reason, and a large point of the dynamic is fear of the unknown. We simply don't know how bad this will get. But imagine a world a few months in the future where the growth in the coronavirus infection rate is steadily declining. This changes everything – coronavirus would then be thought of as contained. The history of communicable disease suggests this is a likely outcome, like SARS or bird flu. But it's clear there is a lot of pain between here and there, and we won't come out the same. The effective quarantines in effect are forcing us to think about public health in a different way.

For contrarians, this is not the moment to get fearful. I suspect we'll be hearing stories in the coming months about large bets made during the coronavirus panic that paid off greatly. I talked to one investor this week who moved into cash at just the right time, but also pointed out you have to get two things right – when to get out, and when to get back in. Calling the bottom is just as tricky as calling the top. But great upheaval carries with it great opportunity.

The same contrarian advice applies to coins. Many dealers are touting gold in recent days, but let me suggest that the best time to chase these coins is not when they are being heavily promoted. I like gold as much as the next guy, but I'm a lot more concerned about structural problems in the U.S. debt than coronavirus. Again, government debt is so ingrained in our culture that everyone just accepts it and assumes it will never be a problem. Politicians on both sides of the aisle proclaim our impending debt-related doom, but somehow it's never pressing enough to actually take action. The short-term goals always hold sway - getting re-elected is job one, and tax cuts or increased social services never fail to move the odds in one's favor. We've just absorbed a \$2 trillion debt for emergency relief, which had to be done, but it remains \$2 trillion. How does it get repaid?

In the meantime, use common sense and take care of yourself. Frequent handwashing is a must and good practice even in the absence of widespread



disease. Most of us are currently under stay at home orders and for good reason. I'm going outside only for food, and washing hands after handling anything that comes into the house. A big thanks to all the medical professionals who are going above and beyond the call – let's all do our part by not making the problem worse.

President's Message

[As of March 15] Our world has changed greatly in the last week. Doctors in Europe are being forced to choose who lives and who dies, and the extent of the pandemic in the United States is not fully known, as widespread testing is not yet available. I'm grateful our editor Paul Kluth was able to get his medical issues resolved prior to any capacity issues in our hospitals. If there is a silver lining, the growth of coronavirus in China appears to be tailing off, an important inflection point. It shows that tight controls work, and we may be facing the same strict directives in the United States. Use common sense, and take care of yourself. All of us are facing isolation for a few weeks or months – a opportunity to reengage with your collection and study your coins. Enjoy your coins, and be well.

Even though this column does not normally include online auctions, there was an exceptional collection of Seated quarters sold by Great Collections that ended on March 8. This collection included 20 Bust and 66 Seated quarters. Seated quarter prices ranged from less than one hundred dollars to the prices for the rarities listed below. The Eliasberg AU58 1854-O huge O quarter in this collection, relatively common in low grades, is the finest known example of this popular variety.

With all of the recent publicity and interest regarding the engravers William and Charles Barber, Glenn Holsonbake and John Frost will be offering a class at the 2020 Summer Seminar at the American Numismatic Association (ANA) in Colorado Springs entitled, *The Legacy and Coinage of Father-Son Mint Engravers William and Charles Barber*. The course will be offered during Session 1, June 29-July 2.

This hands-on class will study in detail all 6 circulation coin series bridging from the late 19th into the early 20th century. In addition, we will explore the patterns and mint medals created by these prolific engravers, along with their designs of commemoratives and coins of other countries that were made under contract with the U.S. Mint. Seminar #11: *The Legacy and Coinage of Father-Son Mint Engravers William and Charles Barber.*
