



LSCC 2024 Annual Meeting by Len Augsburger

The LSCC annual meeting took place at the ANA World's Fair of Money in Rosemont, IL, on August 8 at 9AM. Robert Feiler of the Chicago Coin Club, the host club for the convention, opened the meeting by welcoming attendees to the show. Len Augsburger, LSCC President, then mentioned several notable groups of Liberty Seated coinage on the bourse floor for sale or exhibition.

The group gathered for the customary group photo (see cover photo of attendees), which was taken by Lianna Spurrier. Meeting attendees then introduced themselves. Special guests included Norma McCloskey, wife of John McCloskey, and her daughter Susan Anderson. Norma's introduction drew a round of applause from the audience.

Len noted club highlights for the year, including the buildout of the new club website, the appointment of Sergio Torres as Publisher for The Gobrecht Journal, Dennis Fortier's work on the Christian Gobrecht headstone, the continued LSCC presence on the regional show circuit, and the recent publication of Gobrecht Journal #150.

Vice-President Dennis Fortier presented a recap of the 50th anniversary activities in 2023, including the open house at the 2023 ANA convention in Pittsburgh. Dennis noted the availability of 50th anniversary SWAG remainders and invited the club membership to claim any of the leftover items.

Dignitaries on hand for the 50th anniversary celebration included U.S. Mint Director Ventris Gibson, outgoing ANA president Ralph Ross, incoming president Tom Uram, ANA Executive Director Kim Kiick and several ANA board members.

Craig Eberhart, Club Secretary, presented the membership report. The current membership is 524, including 333 members subscribed through 2024 and 191 multi-year members. Members were invited to renew or extend memberships at the LSCC club table on the bourse floor.

John Lundsten, Treasurer, noted a loss in the club treasury for 2023, due to one-time expenses related to 50th anniversary activities. For 2024, John projects a normal year with a surplus. Advertising revenue is an important part of our revenue, as dues do not completely cover printing and postage costs for the Gobrecht Journal. We currently have \$71k in checking and CD accounts, with the CDs earning interest at a competitive rate. Of this amount, \$21k is allocated toward pre-paid, multi-year membership. With approximately two years of operating expenses in the bank, the club treasury is healthy. A complete financial report for 2024 will be published in the spring.

LSCC Education Director John Frost made mention of the LSCC club table on the bourse floor, which featured an exhibit of New Orleans coinage including both silver and gold pieces and New Orleans Mint memorabilia. Several club members loaned coins of different denominations for this

exhibit. Craig Eberhart noted that the 2025 ANA Summer Seminar will include a class on New Orleans coinage led by himself, John Frost and Len Augsburger.

The LSCC club table was adjacent to the Barber Coin Collectors Society (BCCS) table, where John Frost exhibited plasters from the William and Charles Barber estate. Richard Shimkus, also an LSCC member, exhibited a set of three Barber collections (dimes, quarters, half dollars) that were completely drawn from roll and bag searching, which Rich has avidly pursued since childhood.

Ken Otto, LSCC Regional Director, presented highlights for the past year. The LSCC maintained a presence at 27 regional events over the last 12 months, taking club tables, offering educational presentations, and gatherings for club dinners. New events this year included shows in Fremont, CA and Denver, CO. Ken rightfully observes that we have the strongest presence of any specialty club on the regional show circuit.

Greg Johnson, Gobrecht Journal Editor, discussed the recent publication of issue no. 150. The current issue features articles by Dick Osburn, John Dannreuther, Craig Sholley, John Lundsten, Jeff Pritchard and Greg Johnson. The editorial deadline for the next issue is October 1st. Members with new addresses are reminded to notify the club Secretary as early as possible.

John Lundsten, LSCC Treasurer, presented updates on the new club website. The new website prominently displays the user's membership expiration date and allows users to renew or extend their membership. Paying dues online will automate a series of steps that are currently done manually. The new website also imports Gobrecht Journal and E-Gobrecht articles and makes them searchable by date and denomination. About half of the Gobrecht Journal content, from issue no. 1 to date, has been integrated accordingly with continued progress to come. In response to an audience question about issuing the Gobrecht Journal electronically, John noted that the club is committed to continuing print production of the Journal. At the same time, the electronic presence of the club is necessary to attract the next generation of collectors.

John Frost, Len Augsburger, and Greg Johnson presented the literary awards for the past year. Craig Eberhart won the Kamal M. Ahwash best article award, for "Completing a New Orleans Liberty Seated Type Set", which appeared in Gobrecht Journal no. 148. Len Augsburger finished second in this category with his article "Buy the Best You Can Afford", which appeared in issue no. 147, while Dick Osburn placed third with his article in issue no. 148, "The Seated Dollars of the National Numismatic Collection". Craig was presented with an engraved club medal for his efforts.

The John W. McCloskey Research Award recognizes articles based on first-hand analysis and study of Liberty Seated coinage. Dick Osburn won this award for his article in issue no. 148, "The Seated Dollars of the National Numismatic Collection". A round of applause was offered in Dick's absence, whose medal will be delivered in due course.

The Featured Collection award highlights the best Gobrecht Journal centerfold feature, as voted by the club membership. This year's award went to Craig Eberhart for "A Liberty Seated New Orleans

Type Set" which appeared in the Gobrecht Journal no. 148 (Fall 2023) centerfold. Len presented an engraved medal to Craig.

Len presented the LSCC President's Award, for outstanding service to the club, to Paul Kluth for his continued publication of the E-Gobrecht. Paul has greatly expanded the circulation of this electronic newsletter, which delivers monthly news, notes, and feature articles to the membership.

Len then recognized Dennis Fortier for his tenure as LSCC Regional Director (2009-2022) and Vice-President (2019-2024). Dennis has greatly contributed to the progress of the club through the club medal programs, the 50th anniversary activities, the Hall of Fame committee, and the Christian Gobrecht headstone project. He further founded and continues to lead the Seated Half Society. Dennis is stepping down as LSCC Vice-President, effective at the end of 2024, and will continue to be active with the club. The club presented an engraved O-Mint half dollar in appreciation of Dennis's efforts on behalf of the club. The excellent engraving work was done by Joe Paonessa of the Root River Mint in Racine, WI.



John Frost delivered the educational program, which covered the Christian Gobrecht burial site and headstone. Gobrecht was born in 1785 in Hanover, PA, worked in Baltimore, and then settled in Philadelphia for the remainder of his life. He joined the U.S. Mint in 1836 and was appointed Engraver in 1840. He died in 1844 while still at the Mint.

Bill Bugert previously discovered the birth site of Gobrecht, which was the parsonage of the Emmanuel Reformed Church in Hanover, PA, where Gobrecht's father served as minister. Bill used period maps to determine that the parsonage, long ago demolished, was located on the parking lot of the current Trinity United Church in Hanover.

Gobrecht was interred in Philadelphia's Monument Cemetery in 1844. By 1929, the cemetery was full and there was no further income to be had from the sale of lots. Later, Temple University, which was adjacent to the cemetery, wished to acquire the land for expansion of the school. The Pennsylvania courts approved the transfer, and in 1956 the remains of 28,000 cemetery inhabitants were transferred to Lawnview Cemetery in Rockledge, PA. Most of the headstones were discarded in the Delaware River, where some remain visible at low tide, even today.

Bill Bugert attempted to locate the Gobrecht grave at Lawnview in 2007 without success. Follow-up correspondence with the cemetery proved helpful, and the Gobrecht marker was located the following year. The current marker is rather non-descript and states simply "Gobrecht." Cemetery records indicate that Gobrecht, his wife, and two children are buried there.

Dennis Fortier has since led the effort to place a more prominent marker, which will be dedicated on November 13, just prior to the Whitman Baltimore fall show. The new marker will recognize Gobrecht as the third Engraver of the Mint and include a rendering of the Gobrecht dollar. A related notice appears in the current (no. 150) issue of the Gobrecht Journal.

The club offered two items for auction, including a four-volume set of the Gene Gardner photo books covering Liberty Seated proof coinage. This item, donated by the Gardner family, sold for \$200. Norma McCloskey donated a copy of Federal Half Dimes 1792-1837, by John McCloskey and Russ Logan, which sold for \$150. The LSCC is grateful to both the donors and winning bidders.

Gobrecht's Ladies – Seated Liberty Coinage Past, Present and Future | August 22

Liberty Seated coinage is fascinating yet often misunderstood and overlooked. Balancing Coinage to Discourage Export in 1845

From Roger Burdette comes this transcription of a revealing letter, dated June 13, 1845, from the Mint Director Robert M. Patterson to the Treasury Secretary Robert J. Walker. The correspondence details the ongoing challenge to supply the needs of commerce with varying denominations of coinage. Patterson also touches on the relative supply of gold and silver within the United States. The letter is held in the National Archives, record group 104 (U.S. Mint), entry 1 (general correspondence), box 24. Patterson writes:

Your letter of yesterday presents questions, connected with our Mint operations, which are of great interest, and to which I lose no time in replying according to the best information that I possess.

Silver bullion, including foreign coins, is now scarce in the United States. The call which you had already made for it upon the banks, caused their embarrassment, and forced nearly all of them to have recourse to the House of Beebe and Parkall, to whom they paid one percent for Mexican dollars. Mr. Beebe, of the Philadelphia House, addresses me, however, that the scarcity is diminishing, and that we may soon expect silver deposits for coinage, which have been so long nearly suspended.

Mexican dollars are more abundant in New Orleans than here; still the deposits at the Mint there for silver coinage, in the month of May, amounted to only 133,000 dollars. [A quick glance at the Guide Book confirms substantial New Orleans coinage production in this period.]

I am assured that the banks here and in New York are well supplied with dimes and halfdimes, but I think, with you, that when the new postage is come into use, the demand for small coins will be found to exceed the present supply.

The number of dimes and half-dimes in the South portion States is, as I believe, greater than here. They were for a long time freely received as eighths and sixteenths of a dollar, and since in consequence not only coined in larger quantities at the New Orleans Mint, but also at this Mint, for the supply of the valley of the Mississippi.

On the 20th of March last, I received a letter from the Treasurer of the Mint at New Orleans, in which he says, "Applications have been made at this office to receive dimes and half-dimes, of the coinage of the United States, in deposit, to be recoined into coins of a larger denomination. This we have heretofore declined; but there are so many of these small coins held in this city, and they are so very inconvenient for the purposes of trade, that I beg to receive them on deposit to be recoined as stated." To this application I of course made reply in the negative, but it still seems to show that there was an excess of the small coins for the purposes for which they were then required.

As to the amount of the coinage that we can create at the Mint, I have to state that we have two presses now at work, one dimes and the other on half dimes, and that each of them can strike 50,000 pieces per day, that is, say \$5,000 in dimes and \$2,500 in halves. This coinage will not interfere with that of quarters and half dollars, or of gold pieces.

In the five years from 1839 to 1843 inclusive, the average annual coinage at this Mint, of dimes was \$145,836 and of half-dimes, \$55,432. In the year 1844, that of dimes was but \$7,250, and that of halves but \$21,500. It cannot, however, be inferred from this, that the demand for these coins had been supplied, for the whole coinage was proportionally reduced in consequence of the high rates of foreign exchange.

May I ask your attention to the question of the expediency of coining the whole of the large amount of silver which you have provided for us into dimes and half-dimes, Quarter dollars are as little liable to exportation, and form a most convenient currency. May I not order part of the silver to be made into these pieces? You have drawn from our former deposit \$6,500 in half-collars; may I not be permitted to replace these. In support of these requests, I would state that your recent orders found us with \$8,965 in dimes, and \$9,100 in half-dimes already on hand.

Your late draft on use reduced our gold deposits, already small, \$13,500. Gold is abundant in the banks. Can you not order a transfer draft, in our favor, payable in foreign gold coins. At every new session of Congress, we have an application for U.S. gold for the pay of the Members; which I have reason to believe that the banks at Washington have full supplies of sovereigns lying in their vaults.



A new LSCC website is under development. It was demonstrated at the ANA during the Club meeting. The new website can be accessed from the existing LSCC website (Membership/Payments) or <u>http://lscc.tempdevlocation.com</u>. The new website allows members to verify the expiration date of their LSCC membership, renew your membership, and receive instant verification.

As a LSCC member, you can explore 50% of the LSCC Gobrecht Journal articles that have been published over the last 50 years. The articles are organized by denomination and topic. You can even search for a specific date and mint mark, or varieties, or past collections that have been showcased. LSCC will be rolling this website out before the end of this year.


