Results of the 1993 Liberty Seated Quarter Survey

During the fall of 1993, a Seated Quarter Survey form was sent to all club members asking them to report all of the coins from this series that they currently owned. The survey form was returned by 103 club members who reported a total of 3937 coins from this series. I would like to take this opportunity to thank every club member who took the time to fill in the survey form and return it for inclusion in the survey results. It is only through the efforts of those members participating in the survey that articles of this kind can be successful.

First, it should be mentioned that this survey does not represent a random selection of available coins in the Seated quarter series. In many cases rare dates and varieties will be over represented because collectors will often buy extra examples of Seated rarities when they become available. Furthermore, some errors are bound to be made in the recording of varieties on the survey form in spite of every participant's good intentions to be accurate in listing the varieties in their collections. Despite these limitations, this survey provided very good information on the rarity of many varieties. Several interesting varieties have been known for a number of years and their rarity seems to be holding up. Others have only recently been discovered and it will take some time to determine a true rarity rating for these.

A total of 3937 coins was reported in the survey, but only 83 of these were listed in uncirculated condition. There were 56 pieces reported in grades of MS-60/62 and 27 pieces reported in grades of MS-63+. A complete listing of the number of pieces reported for each date by grade is being compiled and will be published in the next issue of the journal. The purpose of this summary is to provide a rarity scale for each date in the series and to identify the rarity of important varieties in the series. Tables have been compiled for each mint listing the rarity of each date in rank order. Furthermore, these totals were broken down by variety for those dates with listed varieties on the survey form. When no variety is identified for a given part of the total, it implies that these pieces have not been attributed to any of the specifically identified varieties for this year.

The table for the Philadelphia dates confirms many of the rarity ratings that have been established over the years. The 1842 Small Date turned out to be the least reported of the Philadelphia dates. This date is recognized as a very rare proof only issue in the series. The second rarest issue in the Philadelphia series was the 1853/53 No Arrows date. This again is a recognized rarity among the Philadelphia issues. Other dates that ranked very high were the low mintage 1886 and 1887 issues as well as the difficult to obtain 1866 and 1869 issues.

Among the varieties in the Philadelphia issues, the least reported varieties were the recently identified doubled die obverse varieties for 1855, 1856, 1858 and 1861. It is likely that additional examples of these varieties will surface when collectors more closely examine the coins in their collections. Other rare varieties would include the 1856 with an extra 5 in the shield, the recently discovered 1863 1/1 and the 1891 with an extra 89 in the denticles.

For the New Orleans issues, the 1842-O Small Date ranked first in order of rarity. This date was closely followed in rarity by the 1849-O, 1851-O and 1852-O issues, all difficult dates to find in any grade. In uncirculated condition, all New Orleans mint issues are rare, including the 1853-O for which fewer than a dozen specimens are known in true mint state. The least reported varieties among the New Orleans issues would be the recently discovered 1847-O with the mintmark to the right and the 1853-O over horizontal O. Several long recognized varieties have remained hard to find. These include the 1840-O With Drapery with the Large O mintmark, the 1853-O with the filled O mintmark, the 1843-O Large O and the 1854-O Huge O.

The 1860-S turned out to be the least reported date among the San Francisco mint issues. This date was closely followed in rarity by the 1871-S, 1872-S and 1878-S issues. The three rarest San Francisco dates in the higher grades were the 1859-S, 1860-S and 1864-S. Among varieties, the recently discovered 1858-S with mintmark to the left remained unique among reported coins. It also appears that among 1873-S quarters, the Small Open S variety is much rarer than the Small Squat S variety.

The rarest date among the Carson City issues was the 1873-CC No Arrows date. Only two coins of this date were reported, one an unverified coin in an AG grade. As expected, the coins from the first four years of operation in Carson City were the rarest dates from this Western mint. Carson City coins from the later years were scattered among the different varieties listed for these years.
